

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

He mihi aroha ki a koutou I te ingoa I tō tātou kaiwhakahaere, a Ihu Karaiti (A greeting of love to you in the name of our saviour, Jesus Christ).

We are well into 2025 and I am sitting at the table in Fiji trying to catch my breath, amazed at the ability of our Lord to do the impossible. We are currently into the second week of our 3-week Fiji National School of Evangelism in Lautoka. It has been such a blessing to be part of this training again, to get to know other brothers and sisters in Christ from a different part of the world, learn their stories, help them become more confident in starting spiritual conversations and share the Gospel with family, friends and strangers, and going into schools, wharves and churches to communicate with people the power of God. I consider it a real privilege that the Lord would use this Maori (doesn't look like one) that dropped out of school in this way.

My whanau's expectations were that I would either end up in prison or join a church (highly unlikely). Yet, despite everything, I received the greatest miracle of all, a new life. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, behold the new has come."

As I look around at what's happening in Fiji, I notice that family violence is higher than ever. They have an out-of-control drug problem and the authorities are easily bribed. Young people are leaving the church, or just not interested in it anymore. Islam and other religions are beginning to take over.

When I look at NZ, our country attitude and posture to the things of God are at an all-time low. It's hard sometimes not to feel the weight of these things and at times it's very discouraging. However, I can and do take heart, because our beautiful, powerful saviour makes the difference. Through His Gospel and the obedience of His people, He doesn't bring reform, but rather, transformation to people's lives.

Working with our SOE students and looking at my own life and those that we have seen respond to Christ over this year, I see things are different. Why? Because Christ alone has created new people with new hearts and new natures. There is hope for our countries. It is found in the person of Jesus Christ. He makes people new. I hope as you read this latest edition of Partners that you will be encouraged at how the Lord is using us in small ways to bring about new life in those that hear the Gospel.

Mark: About three weeks ago five of us decided to go to the park and offer to pray for sick people. My sister Robyn, a friend from Canada and I went down to the lakefront.

Robyn got to talking with an 84-year-old lady who shared that she had back pains which started after a fall a year ago. After calling us over we prayed for her. Her pain left her and as we continued praying a group of four sat down at the bench listening. One was an older Dutch gentleman, the other 3 were students – two from Thailand and one from India. After sharing the Gospel via a rope trick demonstrating the repair

of a broken relationship with God by the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, they took our details and expressed a desire to hear more about the Gospel.

Our tent outreach on Saturday mornings is a joy as well. More Christians are calling in – some for prayer and some to join us! One stall owner came by to testify that her test results for cancer had come back completely clear and asked to pass the message on to Bruce – one of our regulars who had prayed for her several weeks earlier!



Another great children's program for July 2025. Our theme was THE STORYTELLER based on Jesus telling the parables.

Over the five days we covered, 1) The Prodigal Son, 2) The Good Samaritan, 3) Friend requesting bread from neighbour, 4) The Unforgiving Servant, and 5) Build your House on the Rock. We had a really encouraging week with an average of 35 kids per day with 49 kids on the roll.



It's always good to see new kids come along and it seems they come because they have heard a good report about previous programs through other parents such as the home-schooling community and the Liberton Christian School. There is a good mixture of Church and unchurched kids being told about the program through friends at school. At the end of the week, we always have a prize giving and a lunch for the parents. We also had nine teenagers from church helping all week. Some of the workload they shared was doing memory verses, acting out skits, running games, serving morning tea and actions for songs.

I was invited to CYC Waihola Boys Winter Camp to tell the story of Gideon as the theme was Mighty Men of God. There were 40 plus boys, and it was a real blessing to share that

story with them for that one morning mid camp first week of the school holidays.

TRAINING

CONNECT AND COMMUNICATE

This year we have been working on a new training scheme called Connect and Communicate. This is both a standalone training in evangelism as well as a

pre-requisite for Community Chaplains training.

Connect & Communicate is a one-day seminar that is designed to prepare you to be more active and effective in evangelism.

So far, Lew and Jeremy have been involved in a number of seminars being run around the country and have seen a number of people go on to engage with the Community Chaplains training.

Training includes:

<u>Codes</u>

- Understanding what evangelism is
- Motivations to share Christ
- Personal preparedness to be a faith-sharer
- Understanding the true Gospel message
- How to transition to a spiritual conversation naturally
- Using the story of your faith journey as a tool for sharing Christ
- How to lead a person in a faith commitment to Christ
- How to disciple a new believer



Our Community Chaplains love to share Community Chaptains love to share chaptains what they call "God moments" in our Facebook group. Roland (who is in his

early 80s) helps at a Dunedin clinic for people who cannot usually afford medical treatment. He says, "A young man walked into the clinic and went straight to the bookshelf and took out one of our Gideon Bibles. I sat with him as he sat down, opened the Bible and started to read. I sat with him and talked him through some of the eternal truths. He was most grateful and went out again, taking the Bible with him."

We have run our first Community Chaplains training seminar with five candidates in the Waikato. We are encouraged to have 22 new applicants and 16 more who have expressed interest in applying to be a Community Chaplain. The new system where people attend a general

seminar on sharing their faith before participating in the specific Community Chaplains seminar is working well. Sometimes people hear about Community Chaplains and decide to apply once they have learned that it's not hard to share their faith.
